James Mather is a psychiatrist in his sixties who is persuaded, by his friend and mentor Helena

Wolf, to begin a research project on the subject of people who claim to have been abducted by

aliens. These so-called experiencers are often reluctant to speak for fear of being thought

crazy. Helena is convinced that James is the man to draw these people out.

And so, in spite of the incredulity of his colleagues and the scepticism of his wife Deborah,

James gets going with his project and we meet his new patients: Anthony, for instance, a

petroleum engineer who tells a story about what happened to him when he was camping by

the Aral Sea in Kazakhstan; or Mary, the owner of a beauty salon, whose experience begins

with a ball of light moving towards her in her bedroom.

James conducts his interviews in the presence of his research assistant Lucy Cheng, an

attractive young divorcee who has made a study of the history of anxiety, and who writes up

her own notes afterwards. She and James often commune over coffee to discuss the progress

of his research.

Capture is a definitional kind of book: odd, unexpected, full of crazy stuff, but somehow

irresistibly sane at the same time. This strange philosophical fable, by one of Australia's

greatest living novelists, will cut a path through the minds of its readers. It will intrigue, baffle

and beguile them.

It asks how truly we can know the world, especially when the world seems to make less and

less sense. After all, as Deborah remarks, if James not careful he will end up believing his

patients.

Amanda Lohrey lives in Tasmania and writes fiction and non-fiction. She has taught at the

University of Tasmania, the University of Technology Sydney and the University of

Queensland. Amanda is a regular contributor to the *Monthly* magazine and a former senior

fellow of the Australia Council's Literature Board. She received the 2012 Patrick White Award.

The Labyrinth (2021), her eighth work of fiction, won the Miles Franklin Literary Award, a
