Alan Attwood is an award-winning journalist and novelist who currently edits The Big Issue. His essays have appeared in Griffith REVIEW Participation Society and Stories for Today.

Roger Averill is the author of the critically acclaimed *Boy he Cry: An Island Odyssey* and will launch his latest book at this year's festival.

Elizabeth Bard is an American journalist based in Paris. Her writing has appeared in The New York Times, The International Herald Tribune, Wired, Time Out and The Huffington Post. Lunch in Paris, A Love Story is her first book.

Chef **Shannon Bennett** has been described as the 'enfant terrible' of Australian haute cuisine. He is the chef and owner of the acclaimed Melbourne restaurant Vue de monde

Tony Birch is a writer who has published widely in the areas of short fiction, poetry and creative non-fiction. He has also worked as a writer and curator in collaboration with photographers, film-makers and artists. Carmel Bird is one of Australia's

Carmer Bird is one of Adstralia's finest and most prolific writers; she is a celebrated teacher of both fiction and memoir-writing, has published a wealth of short stories and personal essays and is also an experienced editor of many journals and anthologies.

Naomi Brown is the Chief Executive Officer of the Australasian Fire and Emergency Service Authorities Council. She will launch Danielle Clode's latest book at the festival.

David Carlin teaches media production and writing at RMIT University, Melbourne. He is the author of plays including Frankenstein's Children, and the writer and director of short films and documentaries including Out of Our Minds.

Born in England, Jane Carswell received all her schooling in New Zealand where she now lives. She has had a lifelong career in teaching music. She is a Benedictine oblate, is married, and has a son and daughter, a 1912 straight-strung Bechstein piano, a split-cane fly rod, and small grandchildren who are teaching her ballet.

Kathy Charles was born in Melbourne. At the age of sixteen she received the Di Cranston Award from the Fellowship of Australian Writers and at eighteen was the recipient of the Australian Students Prize and Victorian Premier's Award for Media Studies. In 2007 Kathy was the recipient of a Varuna Award for Manuscript Development.

Danielle Clode is a Doctor of Philosophy and has a degree in politics and psychology, specialising in

animal behaviour. After a stint as a zookeeper at Adelaide Zoo, she took up a Rhodes Scholarship and completed her doctorate in zoology. Danielle continues to do zoological research at the University of Melbourne and works as a science writer.

Age columnist **Catherine Deveny** describes herself as a serial pest, professional pain in the arse, cultural terrorist, colourful racing identity and godbotherer.

Garry Disher is one of Australia's best-known novelists. He has published over forty books in a range of genres: crime thrillers, literary/general novels, short-story collections, novels for adolescents, and writers' handbooks.

Reverend **Dr Stephanie Dowrick** is widely known as the author of a number of books in the areas of personal, social and ethical development. These include Intimacy and Solitude, Forgiveness and Other Acts of Love, The Universal Heart and Choosing Happiness: Life & Soul Essentials. Her latest book is In the Company of Rike.

Sue Ebury was born and educated in New Zealand. After nineteen years as an editor and publishing director at an international publishing house, she moved to Hong Kong, where she edited The War Diaries of Weary Dunlop and wrote the bestselling biography Weary: The Life of Sir Edward Dunlop.

Richard Evans is a Melbourne writer and historian. He is the author of The Pyjama Girl Mystery: A true story of murder obsession and lies. His work has appeared in HQ, Quadrant, The Age, Overland and The Republican, and been broadcast on ABC Radio National.

Writer, editor and cultural commentator, **Morag Fraser**, will launch Roger Averill's latest book at the festival.

Michael Goldfarb was National Public Radio's voice in London for almost twenty years, first as NPR's London correspondent, then bureau chief, and finally as senior correspondent of *Inside Out*, the award-winning public radio documentary program. He has been the recipient of the DuPont-Columbia Award, the Overseas Press Club Award, and British radio's

highest honour, the Sony Award. After working in journalism around Australia and overseas, **Brendan Gullifer** was the Australian commercial representative for The Economist and the International Herald Tribune for 15 years. More recently he has written for The Age, newMatilda.com and the Sydney Sun-Herald. In 2001 -2002 he worked as a real estate agent in Hawthorn and Kew. This was a mistake. But it lead to his first novel, *Sold.*

Claire Halliday is a freelance writer whose feature articles have appeared The Age, Sunday Age, Sydney Morning Herald, Australian Women's Weekly, Independent on Sunday, Notebook, Marie Claire and GQ. Claire has previously published Unsung Heroes and The World At Their Feet collections of interviews with important Australians. Her most recent book is Do you want sex with that?

Myfanwy Jones has had short stories published in Pendulum, Overland, New England Review, Pelt, Verandah, The Words Have Eyes, Scratchings and Launched. In 2007 she contributed to the anthology How We Met and her debut novel, The Rainy Season, was published last year as was Parlour Games for Modern Families, a collaboration with Spiri Tsintziras.

Danny Katz is a newspaper columnist for *The Age, the Sydney Morning Herald* and *The West Australian*. He also writes the *Little Lunch* books. He lives in Melbourne with his wife and two kids. He enjoys eating, going to movies and picking his toenails while he watches TV.

Vivienne Kelly has spent most of her working life as a university administrator, and is currently a freelance researcher. Her fiction has appeared in Best Australian Stories, and in 2008 she won The Australian Women's Weekly/Penguin short story competition. Cooee is her first novel.

Tony Kevin retired from the Australian foreign service in 1998, having served in the Foreign Affairs and Prime Minister's departments, and was Australia's ambassador to Poland and Cambodia. He has written extensively on Australian foreign, national security, and refugee policies in Australia's national print media,



and is the author of several award-

winning books. **Karen Kissane** is a senior writer with *The Age* and the author of Silent Death: *The Killing of Julie Ramage*. She won two awards from the United Nations Association of Australia for her coverage of the Ramage trial. Her latest book looks at last year's horrific bush fires.

Matthew Klugman is a lecturer at VU in the School of Sport and Exercise Science and the author of *Passion Play: love, hope, and heartbreak at the footy.*

Author of the Murray Whelan series of crime novels, **Shane Maloney** will launch Garry Disher's latest book at the festival.

Anne Manne is a writer and social commentator who has written widely on feminism, motherhood, childcare, family policy, fertility and related issues.

A former radio and newspaper journalist, **Joel Magarey's** writing has appeared in *Meanjin*, *Quadrant*, *Overland* and *Antipodes*. A devoted traveller, he has mountain-climbed and lived in indigenous communities in many of the world's most remote regions, including far-northern Alaska, Bolivia's high-altitude Sur Lipez desert and the Amazonian rainforest.

Alex Miller is one of Australia's best loved writers. He is twice winner of the Miles Franklin Literary Award, for *The Ancestor Game*, and *Journey to the Stone Country. Conditions of Faith* won the Christina Stead Prize for fiction in the NSW Premiers Literary Awards. It was also nominated for the Dublin IMPAC International Literature Award. He also won a Commonwealth Writers Prize for *The Ancestor Game*. In 2009, Alex Miller was named as a finalist for the Melbourne Prize for Literature and his most recent novel, *Lovesong*, was published to great critical acclaim.
